A. New York Construction company accused of defrauding DBE program

On March 10, 2016 a federal grand jury indicted David Pfeiffer and Thomas Colton with conspiracy to commit mail fraud and mail fraud. They are charged with conspiring to defraud government agencies, including the U.S. Department of Transportation, New York State Department of Transportation, city of Niagara Falls, Buffalo Urban Development Corporation and the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority between May 2009 and 2013 and the DBE program. It alleged that the men used a DBE owned by Colton to obtain federal contracts but Colton's DBE certification was fraudulently obtained.
